**Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)** is a neurodevelopmental disorder that starts in early childhood. It is characterized by impairments in reciprocal social behavior, impaired language, and stereotypic behavior/restricted interests (Pine, Luby, Abbacchi, & Constantino, 2006). One in 68 children is affected by ASD (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2014). The prevalence of ASD is rapidly increasing. New estimates show a 23% increase in the number of cases since 2009 and a 78% increase in case

numbers since 2007 (CDC, 2013). The purposes of this project were to: (a) establish normative parameters of reciprocal social behaviors, among toddlers aged 18 to 24 months, (b) assess the validity and reliability of the quantitative instrument, the Video- Referenced Rating of Reciprocal Social Behavior (vrRSB) to quantitatively measure changes in reciprocal social behavior, among toddlers aged 18 to 24 months and (c) to assess for changes in reciprocal social behaviors in toddlers aged 18 to 24 months. Identification of these behavioral parameters, serves as a foundation for measuring incremental changes in

reciprocal social behavior, imperative for clinical diagnosis and management of ASD. This project used existing data from a longitudinal study, from within a greater longitudinal study conducted through a private university in St. Louis. The utilization of the vrRSB allowed researchers to quantitatively measure incremental changes in reciprocal social behavior over time. The normative values of reciprocal social behaviors of 64 toddlers at 18 and 24 months total vrRSB scores were examined. Higher scores on the vrRSB are indicative of more social impairment. Significant improvement in reciprocal social behavior

between 18 and 24 months based on a mean of 23.2 at 24 months and 27.4 at 18 months indicated an improvement in social behavior within a 6 month range. The vrRSB effectively captured quantitative incremental changes in reciprocal social behavior among toddlers aged 18 to 24 months. These results indicated that the vrRSB is a valid and reliable instrument. The utilization of this measurement instrument is significant for pediatric clinicians involved in screening, diagnosing and managing ASD.

**The Effects of a Multi-component Social Skills Self-monitoring Program on Two Females Diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder** Nov 18 2019

Individuals diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) often struggle to engage in the skills necessary to engage in a back-and-forth conversation, or reciprocal social conversations (American Psychiatric Association, 2013; Koegel, Park, & Koegel, 2014; Landa et al., 1992; Paul et al.,

2004). An ABAB withdrawal design was employed to assess the use of a social skills program which consisted of 2 main components: (1) ASD on the Go module training with embedded video modeling, and (2) social skills self-monitoring with goal setting. Two participants were selected, both 13-year-old females with high-functioning ASD. During both treatment phases, participants were taught verbal components of a reciprocal conversation (initial response, elaborated response, and reciprocal question-asking) as well as several important non-verbal components (eye contact, facial expression, and posture). Participants engaged

in 10-min conversation sessions in which they self-monitored their use of verbal components and set goals related to increased frequency of verbal conversation components. Results showed an increase in verbal components for both participants. Mean frequency of verbal components per 10-min sessions for Participant 1 increased by 10 (initial responses), 9 (elaborated responses), and 21 (reciprocal question-asking) from baseline to intervention. Mean frequency of verbal components for Participant 2 increased by 13 (initial responses), 12 (elaborated responses), and 17 (reciprocal question-asking). These

increases indicate an overall increase in the turn-taking and appropriate reciprocal conversation of each participant.

#### A Journey into Reciprocal

Space Mar 23 2020 The concept of reciprocal space is over 100 years old, and has been of particular use by crystallographers in order to understand the patterns of spots when x-rays are diffracted by crystals. However, it has a much more general use, especially in the physics of the solid state. In order to understand what it is, how to construct it and how to make use of it, it is first necessary to start with the so-called real or direct space and

then show how reciprocal space is related to it. Real space describes the objects we see around us, especially with regards to crystals, their physical shapes and symmetries and the arrangements of atoms within: the so-called crystal structure. Reciprocal space on the other hand deals with the crystals as seen through their diffraction images. Indeed, crystallographers are accustomed to working backwards from the diffraction images to the crystal structures, which we call crystal structure solution. In solid state physics, one usually works the other way, starting with reciprocal space to explain

various solid-state properties, such as thermal and electrical phenomena. In this book, I start with the crystallographer's point of view of real and reciprocal space and then proceed to develop this in a form suitable for physics applications. Note that while for the crystallographer reciprocal space is a handy means of dealing with diffraction, for the solid-state physicist it is thought of as a way to describe the formation and motion of waves, in which case the physicist thinks of reciprocal space in terms of momentum or wave-vector  $k$ -space. This is because, for periodic structures, a characteristic of normal

crystals, elementary quantum excitations, e.g. phonons and electrons, can be described both as particles and waves. The treatment given here, will be by necessity brief, but I would hope that this will suffice to lead the reader to build upon the concepts described. I have tried to write this book in a suitable form for both undergraduate and graduate students of what today we call "condensed matter physics."

Psychology straddles areas from the biological to the social and cultural. Within that vast range, there have been recent

explosions of interest in neuropsychology, genetics and epigenetics, and the evolutionary bases of mindedness. Correspondingly, there have been conceptual innovations and new empirical evidence in relation to the embodied, social and discursive processes supporting mind and personhood. Simultaneously, awareness of developmental processes and their dynamic interweaving of genetic, physiological, neurological, social and cultural elements has also increased. Might such developments help 'connect the dots' between diverse aspects of mindedness and the contexts within which it arises? Whilst it seems clear that mind is co-

constituted of both biological and socio-cultural processes, how might we bring these disparate realms of knowledge together? In a number of these areas, suggestive integrative possibilities have been explored (e.g., predictive processing, embodied and situated cognition, dynamic developmental systems theory) and insights such as a focus on action, 'knowledge as skills', embeddedness and connectivity have been pursued across a range of disciplines. This edited collection of articles bring together such possibilities - and others - in the same forum in order to provide an opportunity to revisit a recurring discussion

within theoretical psychology: The claimed lack of - and potential for - theoretical synthesis and unity. While the chapters range over a number of areas of research, this collection is focused on current prospects for conceptual synthesis within - or convergence of research between - aspects of mind and mindedness. The U.S. Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) program provides non-reciprocal, duty-free tariff treatment to certain products imported from designated beneficiary developing countries (BDCs). The United States, the European Union, and other developed countries have

implemented similar programs since the 1970s. The U.S. program was first authorized in Title V of the Trade Act of 1974, and is subject to periodic renewal by Congress. The GSP program was most recently extended until July 31, 2013, in Section 1 of P.L. 112-40, and has not yet been renewed.

Imports under the GSP program in 2013 amounted to about \$18.5 billion-about 7% of all imports from GSP countries, and about 1% of total U.S. imports.

What happens when local unions begin to advocate for the rights of temporary migrant workers, asks Michele Ford in her sweeping study of seven

Asian countries? Until recently unions in Hong Kong, Japan, Malaysia, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, and Thailand were uniformly hostile towards foreign workers, but Ford deftly shows how times and attitudes have begun to change. Now, she argues, NGOs and the Global Union Federations are encouraging local unions to represent and advocate for these peripheral workers, and in some cases succeeding. From Migrant to Worker builds our understanding of the role the international labor movement and local unions have had in developing a movement for migrant workers' labor rights. Ford examines the relationship

between different kinds of labor movement actors and the constraints imposed on those actors by resource flows, contingency, and local context. Her conclusions show that in countries—Hong Kong, Malaysia, and Thailand—where resource flows and local factors give the Global Union Federations more influence local unions have become much more engaged with migrant workers. But in countries—Japan and Taiwan, for example—where they have little effect there has been little progress. While much has changed, Ford forces us to see that labor migration in Asia is still fraught with complications and hardships, and that local

unions are not always able or willing to act.
